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European Union Law In A

EU law. EU legislation is divided into primary and secondary. The treaties (primary legislation) are the basis or ground rules for all EU action. Secondary legislation – which includes regulations, directives and decisions – are derived from the principles and objectives set out in the treaties. How EU decisions are made.

Section 2 considers the central traits of EU criminal law. EU criminal law is subject to particular sensitivities. In the first place, it is constrained by the requirements in Article 4 (2) TEU that it respect essential Member State functions maintaining law and order and that national security be the sole responsibility of each Member State.

These binding agreements between EU member countries set out EU objectives, rules for EU institutions, how decisions are made and the relationship between the EU and its members. Treaties are the starting point for EU law and are known in the EU as primary law. The body of law that comes from the principles and objectives of the treaties is known as secondary law; and includes regulations, directives, decisions, recommendations and opinions.
